# The Reverend's Reflections



As the New Year arrives, my ministry with UUFCO turns towards conclusion. In the remaining months, my task is to prepare you for a relationship with a new minister – a task I've been working on throughout, in fact. A newer dialogue is arising about the congregation's part in a partnering with a minister: how the *congregation* relates with a minister, not only how the *minister* relates with the congregation. This is rich territory for UUFCO in the midst of seeking a new partnership.

UUFCO has had professional ministry since 2004, starting at a quarter time and growing to fulltime in less than ten years. The quick growth of the congregation is a source of pride and amazement. I've witnessed a huge expansion in awareness of our connections to the denominational community and awareness that we are part of a liberal faith tradition. Yet, for a fellowship to develop a full understanding of ministry, and hit its stride as an experienced partner in shared ministry, would be exceptional in such a short time. Especially so for a fellowship lay-led for 45 years.

As you go forward into a new ministerial partnership, it will be helpful to understand more about the process ministers go through for credentialing. It will impact the nature of your partnership, especially in the formation of a new Shared Ministries Committee or Committee on Ministry. There has been a lot of justifiable confusion about these names and roles.

To become a minister, one needs to achieve: a degree, clinical pastoral education training, an internship, a two-day psychological assessment, diversity training (anti-racism, anti-oppression), and more. All this is summarized in a 'packet' submitted when one wishes to go before the Ministerial Fellowship Committee, or MFC. My packet was 100 pages. Then one travels to Boston to be tested by the MFC panel in person. The candidate's readiness is determined on a scale of 1-5, and success means being granted 'Preliminary Fellowship.'

Next, a candidate must create a *Committee on Ministry* to meet with monthly for three years, and submit to three annual evaluations by the committee, approved by the MFC. This *Committee on Ministry's* purpose is to support the development of a new minister as they take on the mantle of professional authority. During this time, the minister also has a parallel process with a mentor. 'Final Fellowship' is granted after 3 successful evaluation cycles.

UUFCO's first two ministers, Rev. Jeanne Pupke and Rev. Heather Rion Starr, were in Preliminary Fellowship when they arrived. Each needed a *Committee on Ministry* as a requirement of their learning and credentialing as a minister. Both Rev. Alex Holt and I arrived to UUFCO as fully fellowshiped ministers, tested and proven professionals, affirmed and recognized by our colleagues as knowing the bounds of our authority, and experienced in our work as ministers.

Often a fellowshiped Minister will also have a **Committee on Ministry** of an entirely different nature: same name, very different function, and very confusing. This **Committee on Ministry** is a group of highly trusted members appointed to reflect with the minister on the congregation's ministries independently of the board or committees, and to work with the minister in areas where issues are detracting from the wellbeing of the whole or a congregational goal needs

extra support. Examples might be the presence of a culture of insularity, entitlement or poor behavior such as gossip or triangulation, lack of member engagement, or size-transition issues like UUFCO's.

In this case, the minister's role is as key participant in conversation, sharing perspectives and reflecting with the group on the deepest dimensions of the congregation as community. Everyone in the group is sharing and learning together. Evaluations are about the whole of the congregation. When such a committee exists and works well, its reflection processes unite and guide the congregation's leadership, lay and professional.

To describe this relationship more accurately and distinguish it from the preliminary fellowship '*Committee on Ministry*,' congregations have been encouraged to rename this latter the *Shared Ministries Committee*, the title now enshrined in UUFCO's bylaws. As UUFCO moves into a new ministry, knowing the difference between preliminary and final fellowship and these two kinds of committees will be important navigational tools for your promising future.

## Project GRACE Action Teams

### Early Learning Team

UUFECO's Early Learning Team—a project of Project GRACE (Giving Respect And Choosing Equality)—is excited to share with our members and friends *The Raising of America: Early Childhood and the Future of Our Nation*, a critically acclaimed 2015 PBS documentary series. Beginning after the service on Sunday, January 8, we will gather in Linus Pauling Hall from 12:00pm to 1:15pm to watch and discuss the first episode which provides an overview of the struggles in the U.S. to prepare children to succeed in school and in life, and how we can do better—for our children and the nation. Subsequent episodes will be featured in similar sessions in February and March. We encourage you to attend as many of the sessions as you are able to make.

Following the study of escalating inequality last Fellowship year, Project GRACE is focusing on expanding opportunities in Central Oregon for affordable, high-quality early learning. Our studies last year, and our intensive research and meetings with experts over this past summer, have led us to conclude that one of the most effective actions we can take to address the impacts of inequality of income, wealth and opportunity is to help children in adversity and their families prepare for school.

As author Paul Tough, who has written extensively on education, concludes in his 2016 book *Helping Children Succeed: What Works and Why*:

“Helping children in adversity to transcend their difficult circumstances is hard and often painful work. It can be depressing, discouraging—even infuriating. But what the research shows is that it can also make a tremendous difference, not only in the lives of individual children and their families, but in our communities and our nation as a whole. It is work we can all do, whether or not it is the profession we have chosen. The first step is simply to embrace the idea, as those researchers did, that we can do better.”

Our Early Learning Team is exploring how UUFECO can play a role in expanding the opportunities for affordable, high-quality early learning. Options include utilizing our wonderful RE space to help in this endeavor. We want to share with UUFECO's members and friends some of what we have learned over the past 7 months, to help us all make sound judgments about the role UUFECO should play.

In addition to the monthly sessions that are scheduled from January through May, we have a resource list of books, articles and videos for those who want to learn more about this important subject. The list will be available in hard-copy at the Project GRACE table in the gathering hall beginning in January. If you would like the list emailed to you (which will include active links to many of the works), please email Pam Horwich.

We look forward to engaging with you in this important work.

## **Change The Narrative Team**

Why change the narrative? Human behavior starts with the stories we hold in our minds. The human mind on a daily basis absorbs stories. Some stories are labeled true, others are labeled false. From the absorbed stories the mind creates behavior. Some of the stories promote the UU principles and others do not. If we wish to live in a peaceful world it would seem prudent to see what stories we are following, what stories others follow, and how to change the stories so that cultural behavior will point towards peace and prosperity for everyone.

In the book "Change the Story change the Future" David Korten looks at the difference between the stories based on **wealth** and those based on **the quality of life**. In the "Book Born on Third Base" Chuck Collins identifies some stories in our culture which create inequality and division, and how they can be moderated. These two books are a good starting point in thinking about how we want to tell the stories to achieve the type of world in which we wish to live. A series of discussions will be scheduled in early 2017 to share thoughts and actions relating to building the narrative we wish to live.

## **Social Justice Movie Night – 50 Feet from Syria**

**Friday, January 27**

Please join us on Friday night, January 27, for a viewing of 50 Feet from Syria. This showing is in conjunction with several events during the last weekend in January focusing on the plight of Syrian refugees and the efforts of the Unitarian Universalist Church in Eugene to support the relocation of a Syrian family. We gather in Linus Pauling Hall at UUFCO around 6:00 pm to share finger foods and drinks (potluck), with the movie beginning at 6:30.

The film follows a Syrian-American orthopedic surgeon from Portland, on a volunteer medical mission to a hospital on the Syrian border where he provides care to victims of the Syrian civil war. The film provides an opportunity to see up close what Syrians are facing on a daily basis. As one film reviewer noted: "it reminds us that human decency exists alongside turmoil, and can prevail, as long as there are people willing to step up and help others..."

The film contains some graphic images of injuries that are not appropriate for younger children, and may be uncomfortable for some adults.

**Refugee Resettlement Coalition of Lane County**

The January GGC will help support efforts to settle Syrian refugees in Oregon. There are only two places in the state which have federal government approval to settle refugees.
